

President's Message

Namaste dear friends of Hindu Centre,

On 29 September, 2016, we received the sad news of the demise of Dr VK Pillay, who was the founder and driving force for the formation of the Hindu Centre, indeed our founding-father.

More than 40 years ago, Dr Pillay realised the need to educate the younger generation of Hindus about Sanatana Dharma, and that



parents were ill-equipped to explain the meaning of various rituals and temple proceedings to their children. This alienated them from their religion and birthright, and made them susceptible to evangelists from other religions.

Together with other like-minded persons, such as Prof AN Rao, KS Rajah, S Rajendran, Ishwar Das Sharma, Mr D D Sachdev, Mr Panachand Doshi, Dr T P Paran, Mr H Bhojwani, Mr Sat Pal Khattar, Mr M Gurunathan, the group started meeting at various offices. In 1978, the Centre was registered as a Society.

In the early 80's, the need for a permanent home was realised and once again, Dr Pillay came to the rescue, putting up \$50,000 of his own money to pay the deposit for 132 Owen Road, which was used as a carpet store at that time. Through active fund-raising and arm-twisting as well as bank-loans, the property was purchased. However, more funds were needed to renovate it to be fit-for-purpose. He personally approached the Lee and Shaw Foundations to raise \$500,000 for this plus more from others as well. It must be recorded that this spirit of purpose and generosity also extends to the members of his family who have also raised funds directly and indirectly.

We stand on the shoulders of those who came before us. We are indebted to him and his family for leaving a legacy for us, the following generations, to build on.

On 12 November, the Centre held a very meaningful remembrance ceremony which was wellattended by family and friends of Dr Pillay as well as the pioneer generation of leaders. Many people spoke fondly and emotionally of their close relationships with Kanda as he was known to them. Their anecdotes revealed a picture of Dr VK Pillay as a healer, both of the body and the soul. He was Iswara's instrument on earth, bringing love and compassion to everyone.

We are indebted to Dr VK Pillay for his boldness of vision and his far-sightedness and his determination to bring Sanatana Dharma closer to the people. We shall continue to work hard to achieve this.

May he rest now in the abode of the Lord, and watch over the institution that was his child so that we may fulfill our mission and his dream.

In Focus

In this issue of Patrika, we spoke to Harshintaa and Nitha, young volunteers in the Mitra programme about what drew them to the Hindu Centre and what motivates them to be active volunteers

Harshintaa, tell us why you chose to be a volunteer with the Mitra programme and how did you know of this programme at the Hindu Centre.

When I was young, I found out that I could understand and deal with complex human issues and deeply troubled individuals. Since then my passion for volunteering became a personal journey, a natural affinity.

I joined the Mitra programme in 2012. This was the time when I was a volunteer guidance officer with Singapore Anti-Narcotics Association. I had been a volunteer for several years when Mitra Programme's advert caught my attention, and I joined them in 2012.

Share with us some of your experiences as a volunteer with the Mitra programme

I began as a Hindu counsellor in Changi Prison Cluster A4. During this time, I attended Mitra Programme's first *Nava Bandhana* at Tanah Merah Prison and one of the Prison's rehabilitative initiatives, the Gang Renunciation Ceremony.

I became a Mitra Committee member in 2014. Around this time, I

had the opportunity to travel to Uttarkashi with other Mitra volunteers. This trip was a memorable learning journey. Further, working with fellow members to make both the Mitra 10th Graduation Ceremony and ICAC Movie and Dinner night successful were interesting and unforgettable volunteering moments. Other experiences include assisting as a Mitra volunteer in Cluster B4 and Ashram half-way house, interviewing new Mitra volunteers, attending weekly Mitra Volunteer Training Sessions, Mitra Graduation Ceremonies, Mitra Caucus and more.

One of the most memorable experiences is related to the launching of the Mitra Bhajan book in July 2015. Putting the book together was indeed a long and time-consuming process but the finished product gave us all immense satisfaction. Besides this, being part of the Community Action for the Rehabilitation of Ex - offenders (CARE) Network 2015, was a different learning and knowledge sharing experience for me.

In what other ways have you participated in the Mitra Programme?

In 2014, I was invited to attend 2nd Juvenile Awards Ceremony at Singapore Girls Home where I had an opportunity to meet the parents and teachers of the Mitras. In 2015, I was asked to give

a short presentation on Deepavali at Singapore Boys Home. I have also been an SGH Team Coordinator for two years. I also became a Mitra befriender in 2016.

Share with us a challenging moment in your journey as a volunteer.

Writing the first youth schedule and lesson plans for SGH Mitras was one of the most challenging tasks which took a lot time and hard work and I am thankful to volunteers Ms Sumitha and Ms Rajes for their part and priceless contribution.

Nitha, you have been a volunteer with the Mitra programme as well. What kind of challenges have you faced?



The girls I have been counselling come from families where they do not get proper guidance, love and care. Thus they were misled into bad habits and bad company. Some of them grew up in a family given to violence, hatred, 'gangsterism'. As a growing child, if you see violence, hatred, gangterism and do not have the protection of your family, you turn to someone who can protect you. This prompted them join gangs that make them feel that they are important and wanted. Before they knew, they were deeply drawn into the world of crime.

So, what is your attitude to these girls?

I do not think ex-offenders are bad people. They landed in this situation because of lack of proper guidance. What they need is guidance, love and care. They just need someone to hold their hands and bring them into the right track again. The mindset they have is totally different from the mindset we counsellors have. In particular, counsellors are there to help the girls to come out of the habit of hiding in their 'comfort zone', a space which they think gives them an identity but in reality, will destroy them. If they come out of this space, they will be ready to explore the world at a whole new level.

What do you think are the necessary qualities for Seva?

I think the important qualities for Seva are the right state of mind, faith, time, determination and commitment. Without all these, it would be very hard to even be committed to do seva.

What motivates you to be committed?

I think bringing a change in people's life is something that not many can do. The girls I counsel are very young and loving, but misdirected. Just as no matter how naughty the students are, teachers never give up on them, I am committed to helping the girls in my team to do better. To be honest, the only recognition the teachers get is when their students succeed in life. That is how counselling is. To never give up on the people who absolutely trust you.


Bhagavad Gita Classes

APPEAL - Prof AN Rao Memorial Student Award Fund at NUS

Friends and colleagues of late Professor A N Rao have initiated a student award fund at the Department of Biological Sciences, National University of Singapore (NUS).

We are all aware of his status as a world renowned botanist with an unassuming and friendly personality. As a genuine pioneer citizen of Singapore, he was deeply involved in numerous community activities and societies, including his long-term service to the Hindu Endowment Board and Singapore Indian Fine Arts Society.



As Professor and Head of the then Botany Department from 1967 to 1985, A.N. Rao was instrumental in training countless number of students of plant biology in Singapore. Botany Department was the predecessor, along with Zoology Department, of the current Department of Biological Sciences. Hence, a student award to be presented annually through the Department of Biological Sciences, NUS has been planned which is best appropriate in memory of the late Professor A.N Rao (1925 - 2014). This would be awarded to the top student in the field of Plant Biology as selected by the Head of the Department in consultation with a selection committee.

Encouraged by the initial success, the department would like to upgrade the original intent of a student award to that of a Student

Bursary (endowed) that will be an award in perpetuity. The latter would only be realized if the minimum sum raised reaches \$150,000. Our fund raising efforts have been ongoing since June 2014. We hope that you will share this enthusiasm and facilitate the additional fund raising to achieve the revised target for this special cause.

All donations may be sent by a cheque made payable to "National University of Singapore" – write the purpose at the back of the cheque ("A.N. Rao memorial student award fund"). Donors are asked to indicate their names and NRIC numbers, which are needed by NUS for tax deductions on the gift received. You may know that your generous gift would be matched by MOE to help build up the Fund.

Patrika attended the press conference of Ponniyin Selvan', a theatrical production of the epic novel by the legendary Kalki Krishnamoorthy, on the 9th of January, 2017.

Among other things, Mr D. Muralidharan and Mr Elangovan Kumaran, two of the founder members of SS International, talked about the genesis of the play and underlined the challenges they faced in translating the story from novel to play. Even as they shared the story of their tremendous success in Tamil Nadu, they also highlighted how they hoped to glean the support of theatre lovers, literary art enthusiasts and patrons of the Tamil language in Singapore.

Mr R Rajaram, President, Tamil Langauge Council, highlighted that this production will introduce the legendary writer, Kalki, to school students who are yet to hear of him.

Ms Akila Iyengar, Director of Artecompass Pvt. Ltd. spoke about her journey of bringing the production from Chennai to Singapore.





The drama will be staged at the Esplanade Theatre on 28th, 29th and 30th April 2017.

Ponniyin Selvan is based on a number of historical characters and incidents from the Chola Dynasty (10th and 11th Century) especially around Arulmozhivarman later crowned King RAJA RAJA CHOLA. The drama has palace intrigue, rights and wrongs of inheritance, patriotism, temptation, the ordinary man's fairy tale dreams of marrying a princess, opportunism, treachery and vaulting ambition.

The tickets will be available through SISTIC from 9th December 2016 and are priced at \$96, \$76, \$56, \$46 and \$36 (excluding S\$4 Sistic fee). Early bird discounts will be applicable till January 8, 2017.
